WARRANT FOR TOWN OF ACWORTH MARCH 9, 2021

To the inhabitants of the Town of Acworth, NH, qualified to vote in Town affairs:
You are hereby notified to bring your votes for Town Officers, and any other questions, to the Town Hall on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at 10:00 of the clock in the morning at which time the polls shall be opened for voting on Article 1 by use of the official ballot, and shall close not earlier than 7:00 of the clock in the evening; and you are hereby notified that discussion and voting on Articles 2 through 13 shall commence at 7:00 of the clock in the evening on the same day, March 9 next at the Town Hall.
IN RESPONSE TO THE COVID PANDEMIC THE SELECTMEN HAVE VOTED TO REQUIRE FACE MASKS AND SOCIAL DISTANCING DURING THIS 2021 TOWN MEETING DAY AND EVENING VOTING.

ARTICLE ONE: To vote by non-partisan ballot for the following Town Officers:
Selectmen: 1 for 3 Years Town Clerk: 1 for 3 Years
Tax Collector: 1 for 1 Year Treasurer: 1 for 1 Year
Local Auditor: 1 for 1 Year Trustee of Trust Funds: 1 for 3 Years
Library Trustee: 2 for 3 Years Cemetery Trustee: 1 for 3 Years
Budget Committee: 2 for 3 Years Planning Board: 2 for 3 Years
Checklist Supervisor: 1 for 6 Years

ARTICLE TWO: To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to serve as pound keepers, measurers of wood and fence viewers.

ARTICLE THREE: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE FOUR: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long-term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$177,340 payable over a term of 5 years to replace the loader, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110,000 for the first year's payment for that purpose with \$40,000 of those funds to come from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and \$70,000 to come from Unassigned Fund Balance with no tax rate impact in 2021. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. 3/5 Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the Budget Committee recommended sum of \$1,386,579 for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately below. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$97,133 to purchase a backhoe to replace the 2003 backhoe, with \$50,000 to come from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and \$47,133 from Unassigned Fund Balance. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$20,000 for the Bridge Repair or Replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established with funds to come from Unassigned Fund Balance. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$30,000 for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund previously established with funds to come from Unassigned Fund Balance. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE NINE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund previously established. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE TEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,000 for the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund previously established. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE ELEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000 for the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE TWELVE: To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for replacement of the Transfer Station compactor and purchase of bins, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in this fund, and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE THIRTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$24,250 for the 2021 revaluation of the Town, with said funds to come from the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund. *Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. Majority vote required.*

ARTICLE FOURTEEN: To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this Town Meeting.

2020 Tax Collector's Report

The Board of Selectmen issued warrants for the collection of 2020 property taxes in the amount of \$2,922,621.00. Tax Collector remitted to Town Treasurer \$2,729,372.04 in 2020 tax payments, 93.4 % which is about 2.5 % more than 2019. In addition I received a warrant for 2020 Yield Taxes in the amount of \$12,758.91. On 12/31/2020 the balance due on 2020 yield taxes was \$59.51.

I will mail the delinquency notice for the 2020 Taxes in early February, 2021 to delinquent taxpayers alerting them to their delinquency and to notify them of the lien date for 2020 Taxes: August 1st, 2021. All properties with uncollected 2020 taxes on August 1, 2021 will receive a Tax Lien regardless of the amount of taxes. Liens are an expensive proposition – 14% interest plus various fees for taxes assessed after April 1st, 2019. Please pay.

The unpaid Tax levy of 2018 is scheduled for tax deeding on October 31st, 2021. I recommend that those taxpayers start paying off immediately and contact me with their plan as to how they are going to deal with their tax debt. Having a plan places you in a stronger position when a tax deed decision has to be made.

In 2020, 38 real estate liens for the levy of 2019 were executed. 3 tax payers were scheduled for Tax Deeding for the levy of 2017.1 Blanket Waiver was issued for the 3 properties to the Tax Collector by the Board of Selectmen because of the COVID-19 crisis. Please note: Tax Deed waivers can be rescinded with a thirty day notice and only the act of executing a tax deed to the Town of Acworth is waived. All back taxes and interest stay in effect.

Tax payments can now be made on the Town of Acworth website – Tax Collector's button. Payments are entered as received on the day of the postal cancellation. You do not have to wait for a Monday to see me personally. Payments can be dropped off at the Town Offices, but I prefer that you put your payments in the mail. If everything else fails you can call me to make an appointment for when it is convenient for you.

Thank you, taxpayers for your prompt payments, your cooperation and your good cheer.

I want to thank the residents of Acworth for your continued support. This year especially has been a very challenging year for all of us. After more than 16 years as Town Clerk, I continue to find satisfaction in my position. I am grateful to be considered an essential worker enabling me to provide you uninterrupted service.

Marianne Nevelson, the Deputy Town Clerk has been a great help. As most of you know, she is also the Tax Collector. However, she is unable to perform those duties on the days she is acting Deputy Town Clerk. It is best to reach her on Monday from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. for anything related to property taxes.

We purchased a registration scanner this year. This allows us to scan your old registrations and speed up entry time. Please note that providing your old registration is required by state law, RSA 261:148, IV.

You will notice a new and improved look when renewing your registration and/or dog license on line. Now you will enter your banking information and as soon as you complete the transaction, we will be notified by email. We are able to print the checks the next day we are open. This speeds up the process so you don't need to wait as long for the registrations to get to you. For security purposes, as soon as we print the checks, your banking information is automatically deleted. If you are not satisfied with this process you can always call the office to get the amounts due and mail your checks.

I would like to take this opportunity to list some of the services available at this office for those of you that are new in town. I am responsible for registering and titling vehicles. I complete marriage license applications, process birth, marriage and death certificates, file wetland permit applications, pole licenses and dog licenses. I accept voter registration forms, mail absentee ballots, prepare the town ballot and administer the oath of office to any newly elected or appointed Town Officials. Notary Public services are also available. There is more information as well as various printable forms on the Acworth website at www.acworthnh.net.

It will soon be time to renew your dog licenses for 2021 per RSA 466:1. The 2020 license will expire on April 30th. Beginning June 1st a \$1.00 per month late fee is assessed. The dog(s) must have a current rabies vaccine.

For everyone's safety, the office may be closed during inclement weather, if you are unsure or have any questions, please call the office at 835-6879.

2020 Selectmen's Report

Along with the expected Town business in 2020 Selectmen navigated Covid 19, a 50% turnover in our Highway crew, a State primary and a national election.

The year began in the usual fashion with preparation for Town Meeting and monitoring winter road maintenance. Information sessions were held in February to alert voters of the consequences of Charlestown's proposal to withdrawn from the School District. The proposal was defeated saving Acworth taxpayers an increase in school funding.

In March voters passed the budget at Town Meeting and Fire Chief Gary Baber addressed the Hall about the developing threat of Covid 19. Later that month Health Officer Jennifer Bland reported to the Selectmen on area evidence of the virus. State Rep Judy Aron led us to a source for masks which were ordered and we moved our Town office business to Charlotte's service window. Meetings of Town boards were moved to the larger space of the Hall and held on an as-needed basis. In May the Governor published Universal Guidelines for conducting business during the pandemic which have been applied to the Town's work as appropriate.

Road projects began in April with drainage on Cold Pond Road and paving preparation on Beryl Mountain Road. By May the region had entered drought conditions and dust became an issue. Selectmen worked with the State Department of Environmental Services to develop a dust control program for roads undergoing construction. Beryl Mountain Road was paved in early July to the relief of many. During July Selectmen also worked with residents of South Acworth Village concerned about traffic and State Police added patrols to discourage speeding.

In late summer and early fall Scott Sanchas and Earl Kathan gave their notice of leaving the Highway Department. Selectmen began interviewing candidates for both positions. Mark McIntire moved into the Supervisor position and Ed Baker moved from part time to full time operator. Both Mark and Ed have been with the Department for some time. Dave Frederic and Dan Mack came on in October as new hires and had just enough time to learn their routes before the first major snow storm dropped 2' on the Town in early December.

Despite Covid 19 the Town conducted two elections with record turnout in September and November. After meeting with Moderator John Luther in December Selectmen voted to conduct the March 9, 2021 Town Meeting in the Hall. Masks will be required and seating will be distanced. Please watch for more information about this as the date approaches.

Looking forward, the Selectmen have developed a budget with an estimated tax rate lower than 2020. Acworth has been fortunate to have had little virus within its borders and we hope that continues. Selectmen meetings are open to and welcome the public.

2020 Highway Department Report

Last summer Scott Sanchas left the Department for other employment and the Selectmen began interviewing for a replacement. It soon became clear that CDL drivers are in short supply. In early fall Earl Kathan let us know that he and his wife Kathy would be moving out of state and the Selectmen were faced with two positions to fill. During that time our remaining CDL driver Mark McIntire took on the Interim Supervisor position and Department part timer Ed Baker worked with Mark on the Department's end of season tasks. Going from a crew of four to two made a substantial difference in what the Town was able to accomplish.

In October Mark let the Board know he was prepared to stay on as Supervisor and Ed Baker confirmed that he was ready to become a permanent full time crew member. The Selectmen made two new hires, CDL driver Dave Frederic and equipment operator Dan Mack. For the rest of the fall Dave and Dan learned the plow routes and became familiar with the Town's equipment.

Our weather being as it is these days, there were two northeaster rain storms in November which caused washouts and tree damage. Repairs to the washouts were barely completed when an early season storm dumped two feet of snow on Acworth. The crew worked around the clock to keep roads open and then came back to push out snow banks .

The drought last summer was a factor in both our road maintenance and road projects. Dry roads do not grade well and that type of maintenance had to be concentrated around the times we had some rain. The dust generated by our road projects had to be dealt with by watering those roads several times a week. Going forward road projects which require pavement reclamation may need tighter scheduling meaning shorter distances done in less time if the summer drought pattern continues.

Our equipment is still serving us with the maintenance required by rough roads. The 2003 backhoe is scheduled for replacement in 2021 and there is enough money in the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to reduce the cost by almost half. The balance will be paid as a lease/purchase over five years.

The Covid 19 pandemic had an impact on our Transfer Station. While ordinary household trash (MSW) remained fairly level, bulky waste (C&D) increased as residents cleaned out their attics or made home improvements. The fees being charged for bulky waste are not quite covering the cost of its disposal.

The other income producing item in the current recycling market is metal which slightly exceeded the cost of its disposal.

As you have heard the market for paper is all on the expense side and our paper exports doubled in 2020. At the end of December we received a small credit for an export; maybe the market will turn.

Our hazardous waste reimbursement program rose to \$570 in 2020. Out of respect for the environmental consequences of improper disposal the Town has rejoined the Keene hazardous waste program for 2021. Participation allows Acworth residents 24 collection dates over the year to deliver hazardous waste to Keene free of charge. Watch for those dates to be posted.

In 2019 our recycling percentage had dropped below 20% for the first time in memory.

We are back up to 26% for 2020.

2020 Trustees of Trust Funds Report

Current Trustees of Trust Funds are: Torrey Greene, Chairman, Tim Perry, Bookkeeper, and Betsy Snider, Vice Chairman.

Because of the Covid-19 crisis the Trustees only held three meetings with masks and social distancing.

In January the Trusts received \$58,000.00 from the Town of Acworth in order to fund 4 Capital Reserve Funds.

In August funds were disbursed to the Silsby Library totaling \$1,800.00. One deposit was received from the Fall Mountain Regional School District \$18,000.00 for the Elementary School Capital Reserve Fund.

In December moneys were received from Town of Acworth, \$88,000.00 to fund warrant articles 5-10 and from Fall Mountain Regional School District \$19,950.00 for the Elementary School Capital Reserve Fund. There were disbursement to the Cemetery Trustees totaling \$2,481.70.

In December Sandra Binion made a guest appearance in order to find out if being a Trustee of Trust Funds would suit her.

On December 31, 2020 Total Capital Reserve Funds totaled to \$271,210.71 and the Common Funds, being the Cemetery and Library Funds, totaled to \$326,383.84. For a total amount of \$597,594.55.

The Trustees have invested this money with Charter Trust Company: 70% in fixed income and 30% in equities.

Charter Trust Company delivered a total return on Common Funds of 9.08 % and a total return of Capital reserve of 3.24 %.

Meeting in 2021 will be scheduled on a as needed basis.

2020 Librarians' Report

The year 2020 was a challenge for all of us. Due to the Covid 19 pandemic, the Library closed in mid March and remained closed April and May. In mid June, we opened with reduced hours and offered doorstep pickup of books. We had 68 instances of patrons borrowing 123 books and DVDs in June. In July we opened our doors with plexiglass shields around the Librarian's desk. We required masks and social distancing for anyone entering the Library and continued in this mode through the end of 2020.

In January and February, we welcomed students from the Acworth School for weekly visits and book borrowing. In September and October, we worked with the teachers and supplied books but missed having the students visit.

Overall, we had 1,736 patron visits; 1,894 adult books borrowed; 680 children's books borrowed; 380 DVDs borrowed and 407 books borrowed from other libraries through the State Library's Inter-Library Loan service. We had 324 patrons visits to use our computers or access our wireless internet. We welcomed 11 new patrons.

We hosted our annual Chocolate Event in February, but did not host any library events after that.

We are currently posting updates on the Acworth Library Facebook page and the Acworth Facebook page as well as sending emails to active patrons. Please feel free to visit us or email/phone us with questions or requests.

We thank our patrons, visitors, trustees and all who assisted us during 2020.

2020 Planning Board Report

In 2020 the Planning Board published the 2019 update to the Town's Master Plan in a limited bound edition which includes the original plan written in 1979 and the 2008 Addendum with its 2013 and 2019 updates. This edition celebrated 40 years of a vision of Acworth which has remained largely consistent. Townspeople value the Town's rural historic character and its small town community. One significant recent addition has been Townspeople's desire for better technological connectivity as in broadband.

Broadband has been an item on Planning Board and Joint Board meetings agendas for two years. Discussion around broadband increased as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic when area schools went to remote learning in a region of unreliable internet. In the fall the Planning Board established an Acworth Broadband Committee (ABC) for the purpose of researching a way to expand broadband in Acworth. Gregg Thibodeau offered to act as Committee lead and made his first report available in December. At this time both Consolidated Communications and New Hampshire Electric Cooperative are working to expand broadband. Consolidated works with towns to bond the infrastructure and NHEC is using FCC funding to install infrastructure. We will know more about where Acworth can fit later in 2021.

Requests for Planning Board permitting changed somewhat in 2020. There were no driveway permit applications and two minor subdivision applications. The process which was more frequent was Nonresidential Site Plan Review (NRSPR). NRSPR takes place when a property owner wants to use their land for something other than a residence such as a business or creation of a multi-family dwelling. The purpose of NRSPR is to protect public health and safety, promote balanced growth and prevent negative environmental impacts. In the process the Planning Board can make recommendations about hazardous waste, traffic control and various aspects of a project that could affect its surroundings.

The Planning Board worked on NRSPR applications for a dog kennel, a proposed junkyard and a welding business. During this work there was discussion about what uses are allowed under the Zoning Ordinance in our villages and rural areas. There was consensus the language in the Zoning Ordinance needs to be more clear on this question and the Board is arranging to work with our Regional Planning Commission for help with that in 2021.

In 2020 Hank Sipple moved from Acworth and new resident Mark Girard joined the Board. Hank also served as Acworth's representative to the Regional Planning Commission which meets quarterly. If you have an interest in regional affairs please consider filling this open position representing Acworth. The Planning Board meets monthly and would welcome residents interested in becoming alternate members. Alternates participate in all Board discussion and vote when a full member is absent. It is a good way to learn about the Board and the Town.

2020 Conservation Commission

Acworth's Conservation Commission meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the town hall. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we did not hold any meetings from March through June. Our annual Green Up Day was also canceled, and townspeople may have noticed the absence of the many volunteers who usually turn out in late April to pick up litter on town roads.

Routine meetings resumed in July. We regularly review Intents to Cut, Shoreland Protection Act and Wetlands Permits from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES). Other issues involving wetlands impacts also come to our attention. Concerns about the use of Off Highway Recreational Vehicles (OHRVs) on Class VI roads were raised by a Lempster ATV club. The Class VI portion of the Keyes Hollow Road between East Acworth and Lempster is now covered by water year round and therefore off limits to *all* motor vehicles. Signs have been posted notifying drivers, ATV-ers, and snowmobilers that riding through open water is subject to a \$10,000 state fine. Video cameras are being installed so that violators can be reported to the state.

Every fall we monitor conservation easements. Some are held by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, which monitors the town-owned Gove Town Forest and the East Acworth Marsh, both open to public use. Other conservation easements protect privately-owned property from development, and are held by the town. Owners of land protected by conservation easement retain the right to post their property. They are not obligated to allow public use unless they receive a 20% "recreational adjustment" (reduction) in the current use assessment.

During the past year we also reviewed the Schedule of Town Property printed in the town report and recommended to the Board of Selectmen that certain lots be put up for sale.

2020 Crescent Lake Association Report

The summer of 2020 was impacted by the COVID-19 outbreak with significantly more boats (in addition to our local property owners) visiting Crescent Lake than previously recorded. By late July the “courtesy inspections” completed by our Lake Hosts had surpassed the 2019 season. We attribute this to many boaters getting out on the water and away from concerns of the virus. By late July, Crescent Lake Association board of directors had met to discuss the concerns of safety, not only with significantly more watercraft on the lake, but the associated congestion at the public boat launch. In June, thanks to the vigilance of one of our Lake Hosts on duty, we were able to stop a boater from entering the lake that had suspect weeds on the boat in multiple locations. Samples sent to NH Department of Environmental Services confirmed our fears – variable milfoil – highly invasive, was determined the specimen. This was the FIRST “save” among all New Hampshire bodies of water reporting to NH Lakes for the season. While we were relieved to have executed that “save”, the concern was it may not be the last. A decision was made to increase Lake Host hours for the remainder of the season. For the season we conducted 1,401 courtesy inspections, a 35% increase over 2019. Lake Host hours worked were 735.25 among four principal Lake Hosts. Our hourly rate, increased to retain our staff from previous years, was \$11.00 per hour. We remain concerned of the early morning and later evening hours that are not staffed. Anglers, kayakers, any watercraft can enter during these hours and we have little ability to mitigate invasive weeds or animal life (snails, mussels, etc) from coming into the lake. Crescent Lake has always felt a “target on our back” with respect to arriving watercraft and no staff to inspect for threatening species. Our water-quality inspections over the period were very encouraging and our returning loon population bore 2 chicks (1 surviving) for the season. We hope you will consider increasing your annual stipend of \$2,000.00 to \$2,500.00 in order that we continue to support what may now become increased hours in future seasons.

2020 Cemeteries Report

The Acworth Cemetery Trustees and Sexton met monthly between July and December. Our earlier spring meetings were canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The autumn cemetery walk that many of us look forward to was also canceled.

Two cemetery lots (actually, the right to inter) were sold, and one burial took place. Families may inter cremains in the cemetery, provided they have purchased a lot. It is not lawful to spread or scatter cremains anywhere in the cemetery without owning the right to do so.

Cemetery Trustees received two grants from the Acworth Community Charitable Trust. One enabled us to complete restoration of the 1879 Acworth hearse, which is now stored in one of the horsesheds behind the church. We appreciate the painstaking craftsmanship of Bob Skinner and Unity upholster Sally Teague. The second grant would have funded supplies to clean headstones, a project begun in 2019 by a group of volunteers. This project was canceled because of the pandemic.

Expenses for lawn care and tree work forced us to increase our budget request for 2021. While lawn care is expensive, everyone appreciates a well-cared for cemetery, and townspeople have come to expect it. On September first tropical storm Isais felled a huge maple and crushed several monuments. Clean-up work and monument repair costs exceeded our budget and forced us to draw upon the income from cemetery trust funds.

We are fortunate to have the help of volunteer Lorraine LaCasse, who is working to update the cemetery map by converting the Sexton's Excel spreadsheets into a form suitable for printing large scale maps.

2020 Merger Notice

If you owned real estate lots that were involuntarily merged, you may be able to have those lots restored to their pre-merger status.

Your property may qualify if:

Two or more lots were merged without your consent for zoning, assessing or taxation purposes;

No previous owner consented to the merger.

To restore your property to pre-merger status you must:

Make a request to the Board of Selectmen no later than December 31, 2021.

Once restored:

Your properties will again become separate lots; however, they must still conform to existing land use ordinances.

This Notice shall be posted in a public place from January 1, 2012 until December 31, 2021 and be published in the Town's Annual Report from 2011 through 2021.
